In 2010, the charity celebrates 20 years of this special shoebox appeal, which has brought joy into the lives of over 80 million children worldwide. Last year children and adults in the UK wrapped and packed 1.2 million shoeboxes full of gifts and goodies, which were then sent to orphans and vulnerable children living in often difficult circumstances overseas

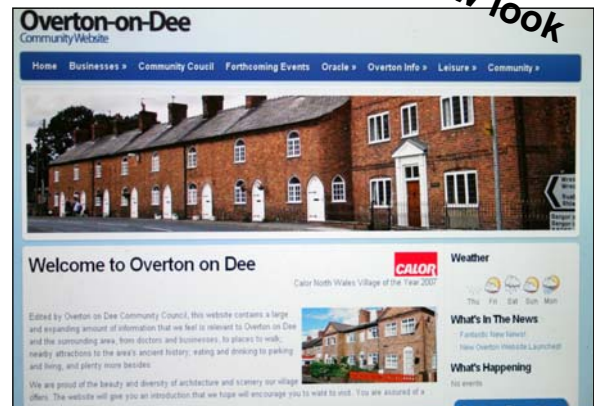

Ramblings From the Rectory

A husband and wife in their late 80s were both becoming extremely forgetful. He would forget where he put his glasses. Then he would go from room to room searching for them. And soon he would forget what he was looking for. His wife would announce that she was going to the shop for butter. But when she got there, she would forget what she was shopping for.

One evening as they watched TV, the husband stood up and the following dialogue took place.

Wife: *Where are you going?*

Husband: *To get snacks. It's my turn.*

Wife: *I want a Hot Chocolate Sundae. Write it down!*

Husband: *I don't have to write it down*

Wife: *And put nuts on it. Write it down!*

Husband: *Listen, I don't have to write it down!*

Wife: *And whipped cream on top. Write it down.*

Husband: *Listen I am not daft. I don't have to write it down!*

The husband then stomped off to get the snacks. When he returned he presented his wife with a plate of bacon and eggs.

Wife: *Where's the toast?*

I don't know about you, but I can be very forgetful. Often I will blame everyone else for my forgetfulness. 'Where have you put it?', I will demand 'You must have moved it!'

People are forgetful. They even forget what this feast of Christmas is all about. Even good Christians can forget. A recent poll conducted by the Lutheran Church found that the largest percentage of Christians interviewed said that Christmas was all about families getting together.

Well that is a part of Christmas, but what about Christmas being about Jesus? Even those who did mention Christmas as the birth of Christ, tended to focus on the wrong things. They tended to focus on the sentimentality of it all. The appealing baby in the manger, ever smiling shepherds and wise men. What they forgot to mention was the love of God for all of us, shown in a baby.

There is one word which for me sums up Christmas. It is not a word; many of us would associate with the festive season. But it is at the heart of Christmas. And that word is **Passion**. It is not a word of sweetness or gentleness. For me passion is at the heart of the Christmas story. Because God does have a great passion for us. Christmas is about a driving desire on God's part to dwell among us, to be a part of us, to be a part of the human situation. To be totally alongside of us wherever we are in life. God loves us all that much. God yearns for us that much and that's passion. So this Christmas, may we stop and think of God's great passion for each one of us, shown in a tiny baby.

Overton Medical Practice

Our new Receptionist Julie Maher has now joined our team. Adam Bond, a medical student from Cardiff, starts 6 weeks training with us in November and December. He will be sitting in with doctors during their consultations with patients. Dr Amy Stevenson will be rejoining us again from 1st December until 10th March, and will be finishing off her Registrar training.

From the 2nd week in January we will be open on Thursday afternoons, the same times as all the other afternoons in the week. We will also be revising the appointment system in January. The Flu Campaign is well under way but we had a slight delay with the 2nd batch of vaccine being held up by packaging problems from the supplier (now arrived). There are dedicated clinics being run in Overton so if you have not had yours done yet, please get in touch with the surgery and make an appointment. Remember you can have your Pneumonia injection as well if you fall into the 'at risk' category and this one is only done once, not every year like the Flu!

We mentioned last month about children being rather a nuisance with riding their bikes in the car park. Now we have an additional problem with vandals daubing the walls with white paint. The Police have been informed but we would appreciate anyone speaking up if they know anything about this.

Famous names - The Maudes by Ken Farrell

Among the notable names linked to Overton (and there have been quite a number over the years) is that of the Maude family. There is often confusion over mother and daughter and their different accomplishments so let me describe each of them.

Mary Fowler Maude née Hooper was born in 1819 in London and married the Rev Joseph Maude in 1841 at St Giles in London. They had 4 children, 2 sons and 2 daughters. After being a vicar in the Isle of Wight the Rev Maude moved with his family to be Vicar of Chirk. He died in 1874 and his widow, Mrs Maude was obliged to leave Chirk vicarage and came to live in Overton at Primrose Hill Villa on Salop Road which she renamed Pandyffryn.

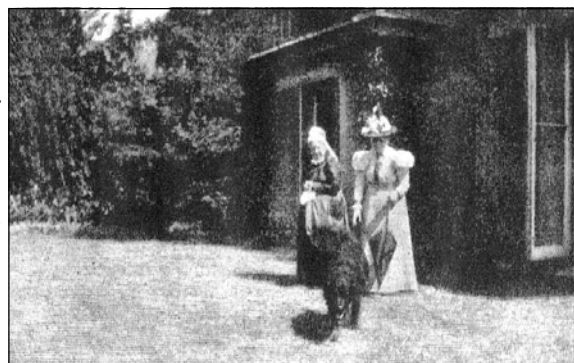


Mrs Maude is chiefly remembered as the author of the hymn "Thine For Ever, God of Love" which she wrote in 1847 for the members of her Sunday School class who were approaching Confirmation in St Thomas' Church, Newport, Isle of Wight where her husband was Vicar. Some years later, when at the Bishop's Palace in St Asaph she found it, much to her annoyance, published in a hymnal with the fourth line of the fifth verse changed, without her permission, from "Led by Thee from Earth to Heaven" to "Lead us Lord from Earth to Heaven". She appealed, in vain for it to be changed back to the original. After all, as she herself said "*The copyright is mine!*".

She published many other religious academic books, for example "Scripture Topography", "Scripture Natural History", "Extracts from the Works of Travellers", "Scripture Manners and Customs", and many of her books have been recently republished in America. She was also an able poet and in 1901 published a volume of her verses, a number of which were set in Overton. A plaque on a pillar in St Mary's Church tells us that for 37 years she worshipped from a pew nearby. She died in 1913 and is buried in Chirk churchyard.

It was Mrs Maude's eldest daughter **Mary Julia Maude** who was the gifted artist. She was born in 1848 in the Isle of Wight and lived with her mother all her life, staying on at Pandyffryn after her mother's death until her own death in 1934. A substantial collection of her watercolours are owned by St Mary's Church, Overton, (see *details below*). Mrs Maude's younger daughter Edith Jane 1851-1927 married Francis James Chavasse, Bishop of Liverpool who is closely associated with the building of the Liverpool Anglican Cathedral, the fulfilment of a long held ambition. They had 7 children, one of whom was Capt. Noel Godfrey Chavasse (RAMC) who died of wounds in Flanders in 1917, the only man to receive the Victoria Cross twice in the First World War.

Mrs Maude wrote this poem about the Crimean War. She did not know that within a few years of her death, 3 of her grandsons would be killed in WWI. The sentiments still hold true for today, 150 years later.

*Hark! O'er the deep blue waters
Heard ye the din of war.
The dirge of sorrow's daughters -
The death cry from afar.
Cheeks that once glowed with gladness,
With grief and fear are pale;
Where children played - in sadness
Riseth the orphans wail!*

*Oh! While your song resoundeth,
Breathe ye a prayer for them
While joy your homes surroundeth,
Bless the true-hearted men,
Who, leaving Home and Country,
And all they counted dear,
At Britain's cry for 'Duty!'
Sped nobly to the War.*

*Lord God of Hosts! in mercy,
Shorten the evil day;
And with Thine arm Almighty,
The strife of nations stay -
Arise! Shine in Thy glory,
On a sin-stricken world,
Quelled be man's wrath and fury,
Thy flag of peace unfurled.*

Make your own Advent Calendar

Materials:

Toilet paper rolls (13), scissors, glue, construction paper, black marker, small wrapped candy. (Optional: paint, bow)

Instructions:

Cut 13 TP rolls in half. Paint them or cover with construction paper. Cut circles out of construction paper (trace around 1 of the largest toilet paper roll ends to get the size). Glue a circle onto 1 end of each TP roll half. Let dry. Drop a small candy into each little TP roll cup that you've created. Glue a circle onto the top of each TP roll half. Let dry. Use a black marker to write the numbers 1 thru 25 onto the closed TP roll cups. Tape 2 pieces of construction paper together to make one large sheet (or use a piece of poster board). Arrange the cups in whatever way you wish and glue them onto the poster board (we just made a rectangle, but you could arrange them into a Christmas tree shape, a candy cane shape or a wreath shape) Add a bow if desired.

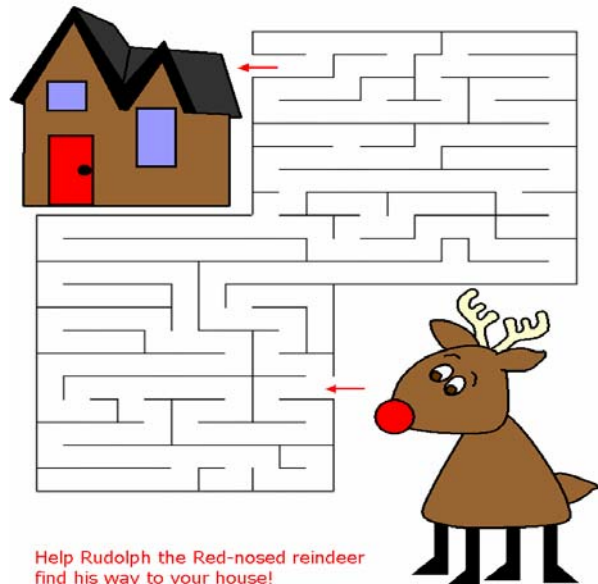
Film Review- THE HOLE 3D
