ANNUAL REPORT - Finance

This report aims gives information about the Community Council, the money it spends and the activities it carries out on your behalf. The report does not detail the budget in line by line terms but will give an overview of how the money has been spent. For a more detailed breakdown, the Community Council's accounts are available to anyone at any time on request – contact details for the Community Council appear above.

Precept

The Precept for 2024/25 was set at £73,381 (an increase in the previous year) Figure 1

The Precept is set after the budget has been agreed and approved by the members of Overton Community Council and it is used wholly for funding the following;

- Staff salaries (Clerk and Caretaker)
- Grounds maintenance Contractor for Playingfields and park, Cemetery and Cenotaph
- Rental of the Playingfield, maintenance and installation of all the play equipment
- Maintenance of the Millennium Meadow - including trees and benches
- Cemetery administration
- Maintenance of the War Memorial
- Cleaning and maintenance of the toilets
- Streetlight electricity, maintenance and repair of the lights, Christmas tree and Christmas lights
- Payments of rates and utilities
- General office administration, equipment and software packages and parish room hire
- Members/Clerks costs
- Insurance, Accountancy and Audit (internal and external)
- Grants and donations given to local organisations including Overton Twinning, Playcentre St. Mary's School and organisation of the Annual Village Fete

Grants to local associations

Each year the Community Council makes annual grants to organisations within the village. The total amount awarded in 2024/25 was £1300 and was divided between the Overton Oracle, Overton Play Centre, Twinning Association and the Royal British Legion.

Community Chest Grants

Each year the Community Chest Grant Scheme is funded from an annual community payment received from the Operator of the solar farm (Snellius Energy). The Community Council makes financial contributions to local organisations which provide valuable services that bring benefit to the local community. Funded solely out of dividends, applications are reviewed and allocated accordingly. In 2024, £3603.86 in total, was awarded to St. Mary's School, Overton Playcentre, 1st Overton Scout Group, Overton Royal British Legion and Overton Twinning Association.

Note: In order to be considered for inclusion for a Community Chest grant in 2025-26 you will need to apply before 31st October 2025.

CLERK'S REPORT

The Community Council makes most of its decisions at its monthly Full Council meeting. An agenda is set and circulated one week before. The meeting is attended by County Councillor John McCusker and Police Community Support Officer, Lisa-Marie Davies.

The first ten minutes of the meeting are allocated to members of the public to raise issues, concerns or ideas with the Community Council.

There are three other committees which meet regularly: General Amenities, Planning and Finance.

Planning is part of the Council's remit and as a statutory consultee the Community Council is asked to comment on all planning applications which affect the community. A group of Councillors (the Planning Committee) meet and review applications as they arise in order to forward any comments to WCBC Planning Department (there were 6 meetings in 2025-2026).

The annual village fete was held at the end of June. There was great support for the two main events, the Street Market and the Big Picnic. There was a great selection of stalls and local shops in the market and even the sun made an appearance.

The dog show once again, proved to be a fun filled part of the Big Picnic on the Playingfield on a Saturday afternoon.

Thank you to all who helped with the organisation and all you who attended this regular feature of the village calendar.

It has been a busy year and I would personally like to thank all the Councillors who give their time freely, for all their support, advice and hard work.

ABOUT THE COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Role of the Council Community Councils are known as the first tier of local government, the tier closest to the residents it represents and consisting of local people working to benefit the local area.

It is consulted on –

- Planning Applications
- Consultations and Comments on County Council formal policy changes e.g. street lighting, affordable housing and changes to play areas, grass cutting, street cleaning etc.

It works to provide, support, maintain and improve facilities to benefit the local area –

Currently -

- Regular inspection and maintenance of the play and exercise areas in the park
- Regular inspection and review of all trees in the millennium meadow and recreational areas
- Inspection and maintenance of Overton Cemetery and the allocation and purchase of burial plots in the Cemetery and Garden of Remembrance
- The maintenance (and recent refurbishment) of the War Memorial in the High Street.
- Provision of two community defibrillators and their ongoing maintenance. One situated near the football pavilion and a second near the entrance to the village hall (pictured)
- Provision of Dog Waste Bag Dispensers at key locations around the village (pictured)



- Maintenance and cleaning of public toilets in the main village car park and Playingfields
- Local litter hub providing large bags for litter collection and litter grabbers, working closely with Keep Wales Tidy and WCBC
- Community Hub – every Monday between 2pm and 4pm (poster pictured)
